
#### STUDY TOUR to ENGLAND




## **Announcement #3**

GARY'S CORNER



Towards the end of the Smithsonian program last Saturday, July 17, 2021, "England as the Custodian of the Jewish Past," I mentioned that John Milton tutored Roger Williams in Hebrew.

We forget how many of the early American colonial leaders knew Hebrew, including Williams.

For those who wish to know more about this fascinating topic, see the engaging book by my long-time friend and colleague, Shalom Goldman (Middlebury College), <u>God's Sacred</u> <u>Tongue</u> (2014).




Image used during Gary's PowerPoint presentation last week.

Williams was first an Anglican and then a Puritan, but he took a more liberal stance than his co-religionists in Massachusetts. And thus he decamped for what is today Rhode Island, where he founded Providence Plantations, with its more tolerant stance. Baptists, Quakers, and Jews, for example, all found a haven in Rhode Island.

The First Baptist Church in Newport, R.I., co-founded by Williams in 1638, is the oldest Baptist congregation in the U.S.

The Jews arrived in Newport twenty years later, in 1658, making it the second oldest Jewish community in the U.S. (after New Amsterdam / New York - 1654).
